

Safety Plans

Safety Plans are a key tool we use to develop safety with a child, family and their network

What should be in a safety plan?

WHAT we will see:

Describes specific behaviours that will address the concerns in the danger statements

WHAT the family/carer/network will show us:

Outlines clear expectations and responsibilities for each person

WHAT it will involve:

Building on strengths identified and using the families/carers/networks idea's

WHEN will things happen by, set timescales & reviews

How plans develop and change over time

Immediate Safety Plans – The plan that you make quickly or when there has been a crisis. This is a short-term safety plan which focuses on reducing the imminent risk – this will then need review.

Interim Safety Plan – The plan that is then developed by the network, parents, children and social worker that starts off the process of developing a more detailed safety plan through a family network meeting.

Final Safety Plan – The plan that has been tested, has worked and we are happy that the family can follow this into the future, and that accounts for future changes that might arise.

SAFETY is strengths demonstrated as protection over time

Where to record a safety plan?

This should be record within the WORD DOCUMENT TEMPLAE and uploaded to mosaic documents.

Within the mosaic plan -

The family and network table can be utilised to add other actions, or to reference the safety plan in documents elsewhere
