Introduction

This guidance will help practitioners who are supporting children, young people and their families, who are experiencing the effects of domestic abuse.

Course Aim: Day 1 Examine attitudes and understanding of domestic abuse,

assessment and management.

Day 2 Develop an understanding of the effects of domestic abuse, impact on child adult relationship and gain a knowledge

of how to offer support.

The DALPs role is to be a point of contact for CYPFS Practitioners. They can discuss and explore safe and supportive engagement and safety planning with victims of domestic abuse taking into account the full impact of coercive controlling behaviour on the non-abusive parent's ability to parent and support their children.

Statutory Guidance Home Office

Domestic abuse is cruel and complex, and can affect anyone, leaving physical and emotional scars that can last a lifetime. The 2019 to 2020 Crime Survey for England and Wales (CSEW) estimates that 2.3 million adults aged 16 to 74 in England and Wales experienced domestic abuse in the previous year, the majority of whom were female (2022) They have published the following statutory guidance:
