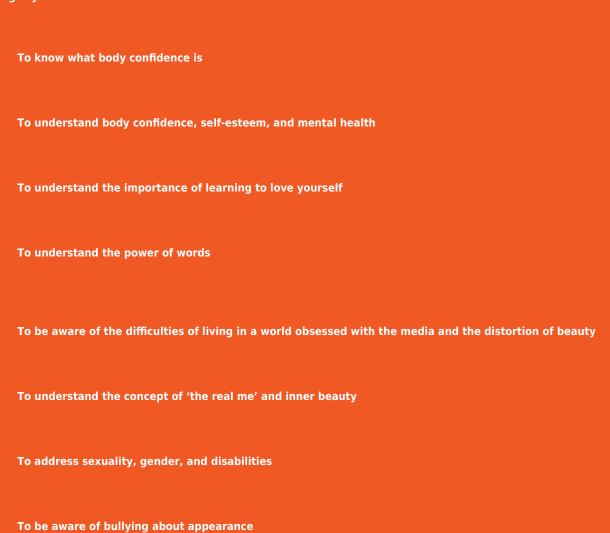

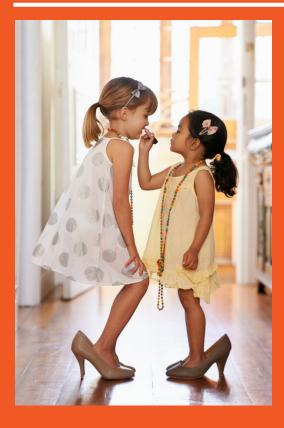

It should be understood as completely rational for a child to close down and refuse to tell a professional anything about themselves - and yet it leaves many wondering what they could have done differently or why the child doesn't trust them. This course will take professionals through the experiences of children, the experiences of professionals, and the evidence surrounding disclosure, rapport-building, and the barriers to relationship-building.

Professionals will learn the most common barriers to rapport-building, why children should not be expected to disclose, and how to avoid strategies that mirror the behaviours and techniques of the sex offender.

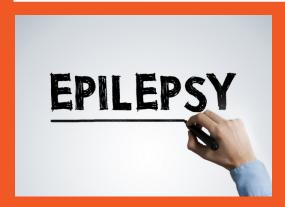

Concerns about a child's welfare may arise in many different contexts, and the nature of these concerns will vary greatly from case to case. What is important is that action is taken quickly so that a problem does not escalate.

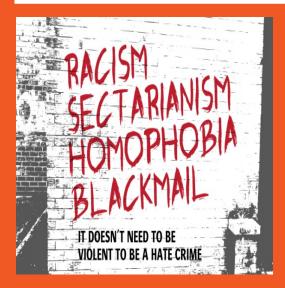

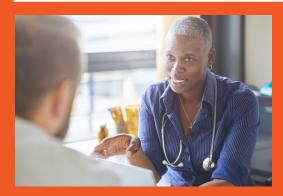

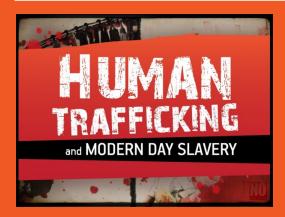

This course looks at how carers can eliminate these behaviours and why young people might display manipulative behaviours in the first place.

A fostering breakdown is heartbreaking for all involved - the social workers who placed the child, the therapist who tried to resolve the issues with the family, the foster carers who thought they were up to the task of caring and supporting this young person, and most of all, for the young person who is once again embraced by rejection and loss.

In this course, learners can find out more about placement breakdowns and what we can do to support all those involved.

To look at the events and behaviours leading up to placement breakdown

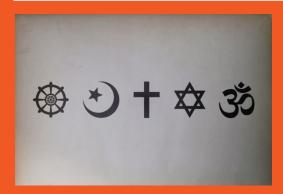
