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## Extra Familial Harm Risk Guidance

The table below is a tool to be used to help practitioners and partners understand what we mean when we use the terms emerging, medium or high risk of Extra Familial Harm. This is not at exhaustive list and the detail below are examples only as each young person and the circumstances that they find themselves in will be unique and must be considered on a child-by-child basis, considering the context, age of child and their needs.

Professionals are requested to be conscious of the differing elements of their own identity and bias and the identity of the children and families they are supporting being particularly mindful of age, gender, ethnicity, learning needs, disability and <u>adultification</u>. In order to do this please use the <u>social graces</u> tool to help you make an unbiased decision across the range of extra familial harms detailed below.

When considering young people involved in the criminal justice system we need to include children who are high risk of re-offending and/or safety and wellbeing and who present as a risk of serious harm to others.

Ideally a referral and its outcome would be shared in most circumstances with the child involved. Consent from the child is not required as the safeguarding threshold has been reached. At times sharing information and safety plans may place the child at further risk and so a multi-agency decision should be made, recorded and communicated in writing and the best person identified to share information with the child.

EFH considers Care Leavers post their 18th birthday, according to vulnerability and where consent has been given.

Medium - The child is or is likely to be suffering extra familial harm and is causing or likely to cause harm and needs targeted intervention. The harm is taking place in context/locality, or the threat is likely and will impact the child(ren) and/or the community
